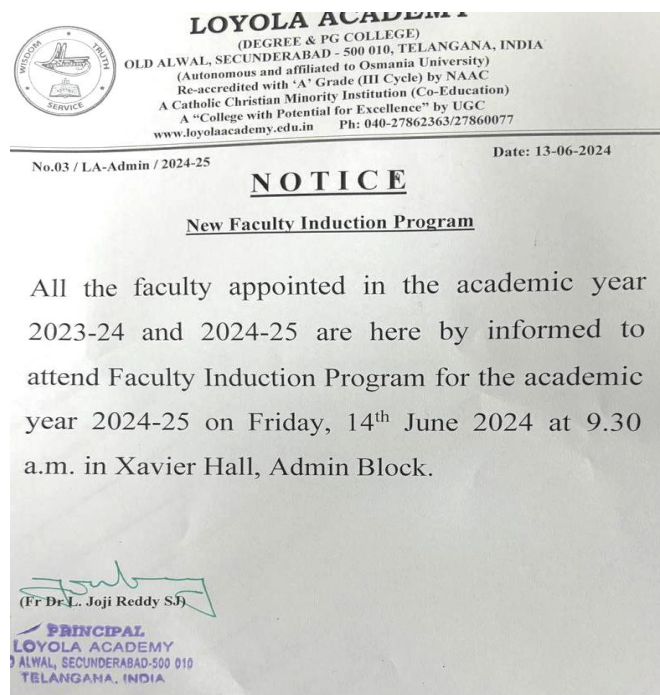

Report:

To understand and assimilate the national and international methodologies of teaching and learning, the IQAC organized a two-day Orientation Programme for all the teaching fraternity on 18th & 19th June 2024. Rev. Fr. Ch. Amara Rao, SJ and Rev. Fr. Dr. L. Joji Reddy, SJ, Principal blessed and welcomed the gathering. To orient the newly recruited staff and the existing staff on reformed criterion levels of NAAC, the management invited Dr. J.A. Charles, Deputy Principal, Loyola College, Chennai and Dr. V. Radhika Devi, Vice-Principal, Dean, Dept of S&H and IQAC, Malla Reddy Institute of Technology, Hyderabad as resource persons.

On the first day, Dr. J.A. Charles spoke on *NAAC Accreditation- Changing Scenario* dividing his presentation into four sessions. In the first session, he spoke on the major reforms of NAAC, including the new mode that is going to be implemented in future and the binary system of accreditation. Sir also stressed on the importance of both organizing and attending seminars, hackathons and workshops for students as they help in more experiential learning which is undoubtedly the need of the hour. He emphasised on the placements, higher educational opportunities and suggested some techniques and tips to help the students to procure good placement with a hefty payment. 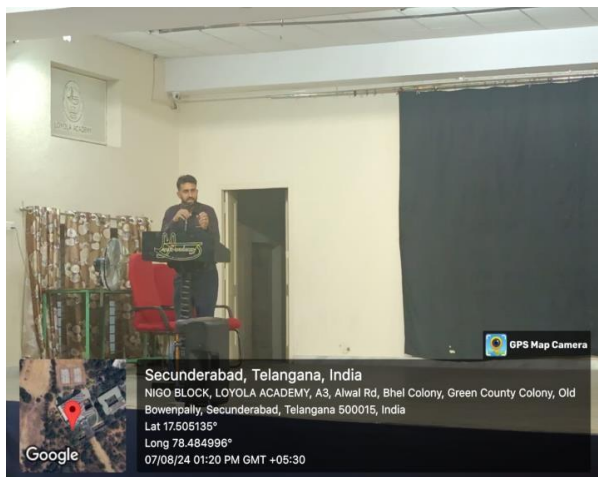


12. Union Budget Discussion 07th August 2024

13. Ethical Hacking (3 Days Workshops) 7th to 10th August 2024:

Objective:

- The Department of B.Sc. Computer science & Cyber security organized a 4-Days Student Development Program (Workshop) on **Ethical Hacking in Collaboration with Supraja Technologies** from **7th to 10th August 2024** at Degree3 Lab in Loyola Academy. Participants engaged in hands-on activities, learning about ethical hacking techniques, security vulnerabilities, and countermeasures. The workshop aimed to equip attendees with practical skills to enhance information security.

Brief Description about the Event:

- The 4-day workshop on Ethical Hacking, conducted by Supraja Technologies, was a deep dive into the fundamental concepts and practical applications of cyber security. Each day was divided into two sessions, allowing participants to fully engage with both theoretical knowledge and hands-on practice. The final session on the last day included a comprehensive test to assess the skills learned. Total 38 students participated.

Day 1: 06-08-2024

- **Session 1: Introduction and Setup:** The first session began with an introduction to various cyber security roles such as SOC Analyst and Penetration Tester. The instructor discussed the academic pathways and certifications essential for entering these fields. Following this, participants were guided through the configuration and setup of Kali Linux, a specialized Linux distribution used for penetration testing. This session laid the foundation for the practical exercises that followed.
- **Session 2: Phishing and SQL Injection:** The second session focused on phishing attacks and SQL injection, two common threats in the cyber security landscape. Participants were introduced to Zphisher, a tool for simulating phishing attacks, and given hands-on experience in crafting phishing campaigns. The session concluded with an exploration of SQL injection vulnerabilities, where attendees practiced exploiting these weaknesses in web applications using Kali Linux.

Day 2: 07-08-2024

- **Session 1: Web Application Vulnerabilities:** The third session of the workshop delved into web application vulnerabilities, specifically cart tampering, parameter tampering, and Insecure Direct Object Reference (IDOR) attacks. Participants learned how to manipulate online shopping carts and web parameters to exploit application weaknesses. The session also covered IDOR attacks, providing practical examples of how to identify and exploit these vulnerabilities.
- **Session 2: Google Dorking and Burp Suite Setup:** In the fourth session, participants were introduced to Google Dorking, a technique for finding vulnerable websites using advanced search queries. The session then transitioned to setting up Burp Suite, a tool essential for web application security testing. Attendees learned how to install, create, and authenticate SSL/TLS certificates within Burp Suite, preparing them for more advanced tasks in the following sessions.

Day 3: 08-08-2024

- **Session 1: Burp Suite and Rate Limiting:** The fifth session was dedicated to integrating Firefox with Burp Suite, allowing participants to intercept and analyze web traffic effectively. The session also covered the concept of rate limiting in web applications, with a focus on identifying and exploiting scenarios where no rate limiting was enforced. These exercises were critical for understanding how attackers can abuse web services.
- **Session 2: PortSwigger Labs and Race Conditions:** The sixth session introduced participants to PortSwigger's Web Security Academy, where they engaged in labs focusing on race conditions. Race conditions are vulnerabilities that occur when multiple processes attempt to access shared resources simultaneously. Through hands-on labs, attendees practiced exploiting these vulnerabilities, gaining a deeper understanding of the potential risks and mitigations.

Day 4: 09-08-2024

- **Session 1: Local File Inclusion and Windows Setup:** The seventh session began with an exploration of Local File Inclusion (LFI) attacks, where participants learned how to exploit LFI vulnerabilities to gain unauthorized access to sensitive files on a server. Following this, the session shifted to the installation and configuration of Windows 7 and 10 operating systems. Setting up these environments was crucial for the exercises involving Windows-specific vulnerabilities.
- **Session 2: Metasploit, Network Intrusion, and Final Test:** The final session of the workshop was a culmination of all the skills learned over the previous days. Participants were introduced to the Metasploit Framework, a powerful tool for developing and executing exploit code. They practiced cracking Windows 7 and 10 passwords and performed network intrusion exercises using Metasploit and Kali Linux. The session concluded with a comprehensive test, assessing the participants' understanding of the workshop content and their ability to apply these skills in real-world scenarios.

Outcome:

The Ethical Hacking Workshop provided participants with a solid foundation in cybersecurity, combining theoretical knowledge with practical, hands-on experience. The final test on the last day served as both a challenge and a measure of the skills acquired during the workshop. This experience is invaluable for anyone looking to advance in the field of cybersecurity.



14. Awareness on hygiene and nutrition-14th August 2024

Report on Visit to Primary School, Anganwadi and Primary Health Care Centre

As a part of nutrition awareness programme the third-year students of B.Sc. (Food science, Nutrition and Dietetics) visited Lingapur and Bramajiguda village (adopted village) near Medchal on 14th of August 2024. In that village we mainly visited primary school to provide knowledge on nutrition and food intake with presentation on charts, pamphlets in the easy way so that the children can understand just by looking at it. As a part of this program we explained about personal hygiene practices and also made them understood about the type of food they should take and in what quantity they should take daily. Firstly, we introduced ourselves to the children, explained about this program & the uses of it, we made them understood completely about food intake and personal hygiene & asked them to follow it on a daily basis. Interactive Session with the Guest:

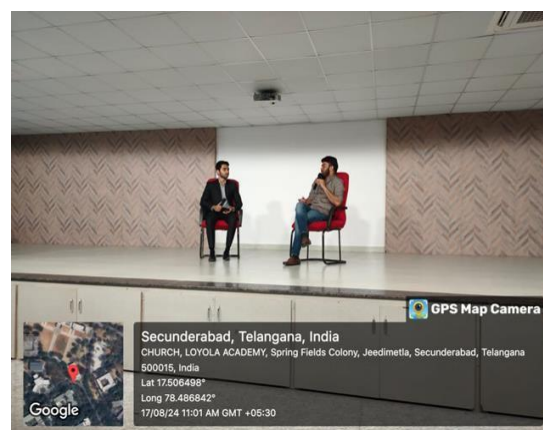

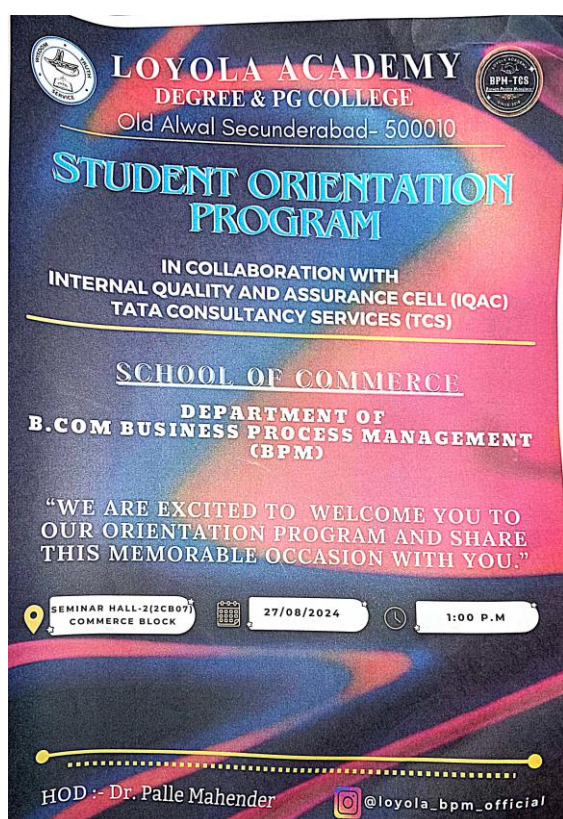

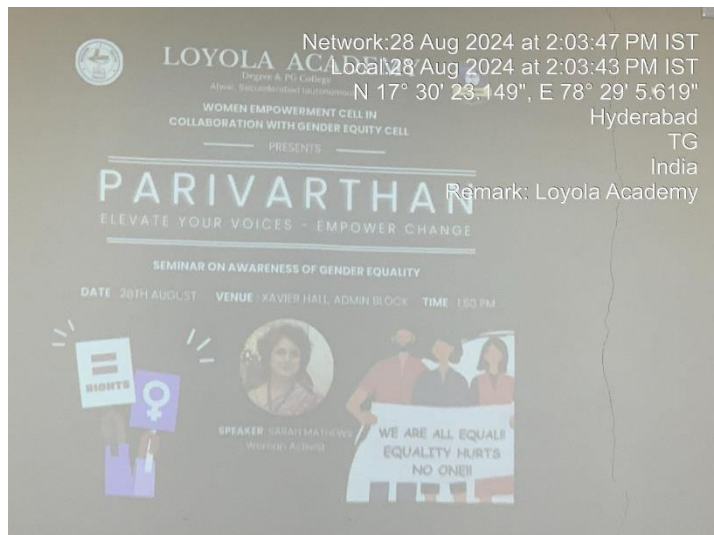


Conclusion

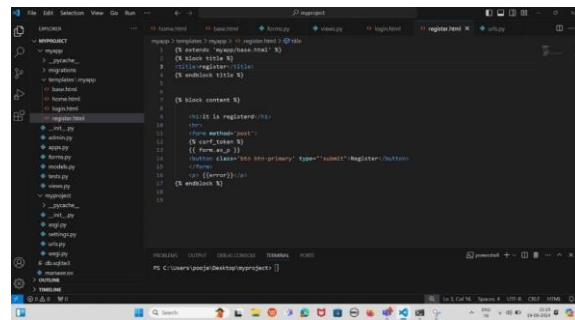

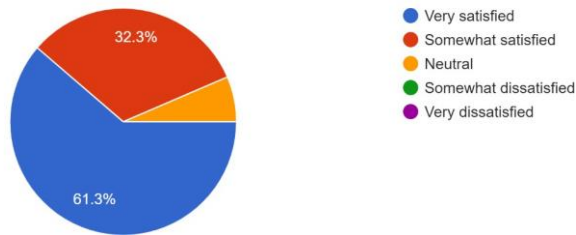

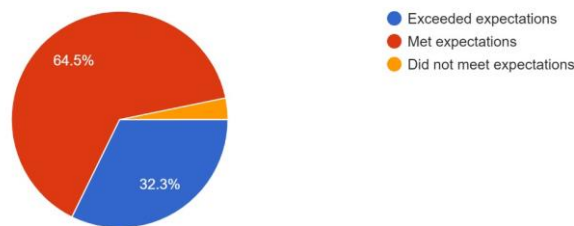
1) How satisfied were you with the workshop?

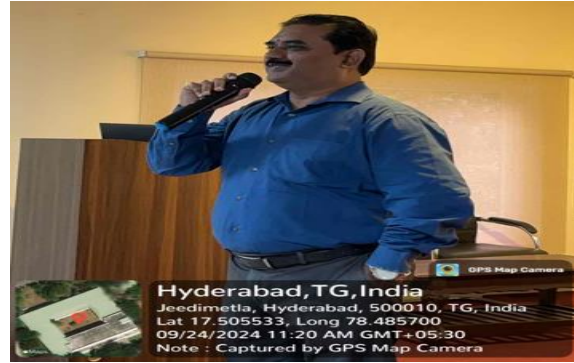

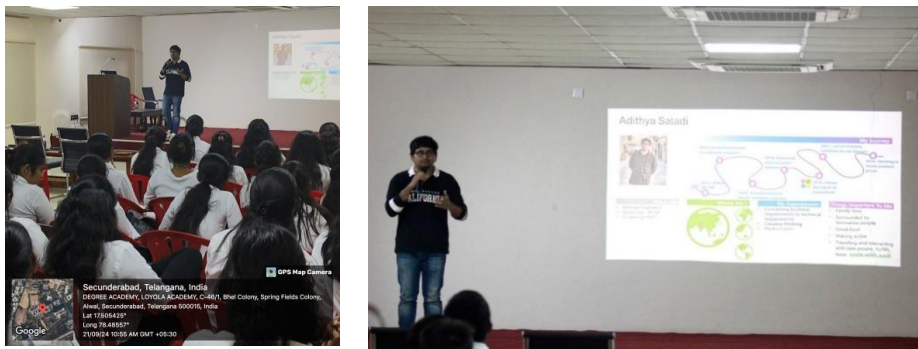

Industry Talk on Deployment of application in Microsoft Azure Cloud

This demonstration gave participants a hands-on understanding of the development process, while also introducing modern tools like GitHub Copilot. The session sparked great interest in cloud computing and automation, leaving attendees with a clear understanding of Azure's capabilities and the advantages of deploying web applications on the platform.

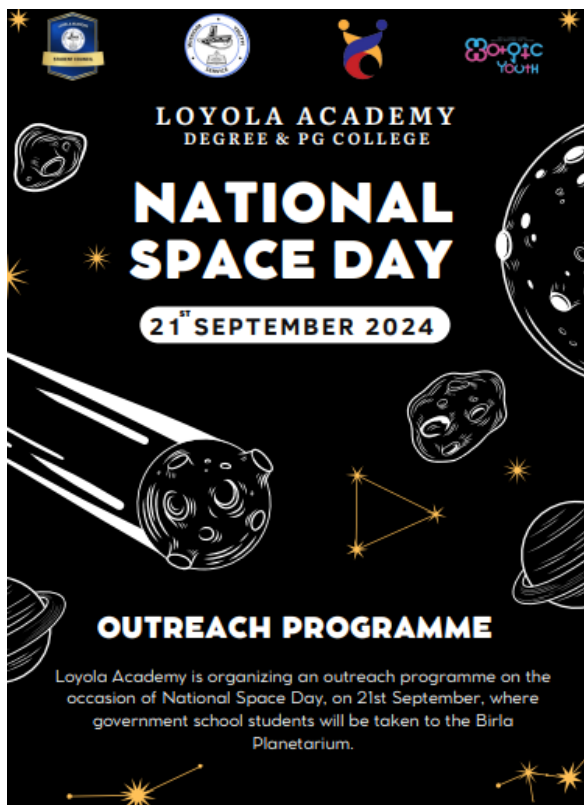



- **Effective Teaching and Mentoring:** Refining pedagogical approaches, developing effective mentoring strategies, and promoting inclusive learning environments.

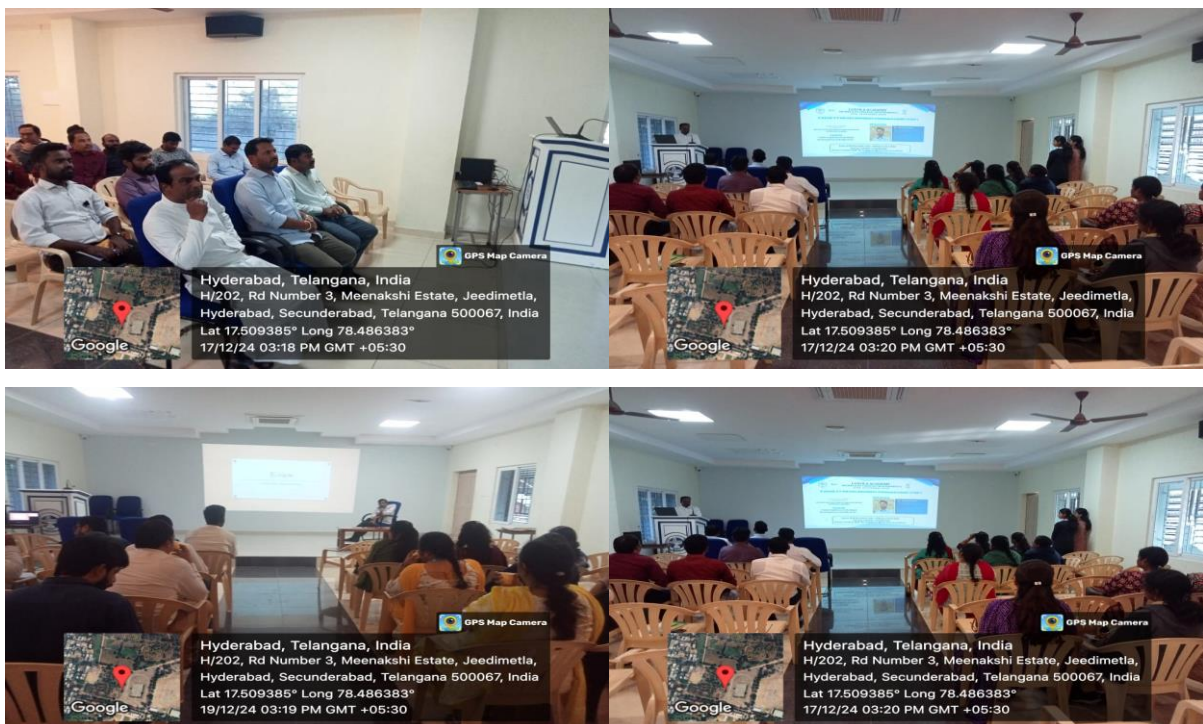

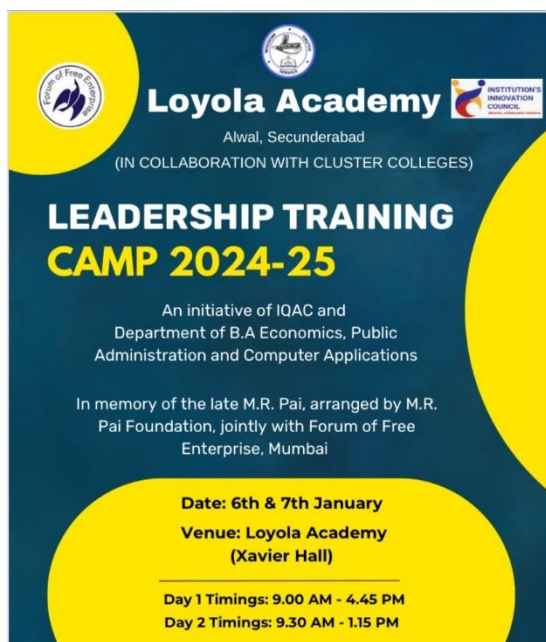

Mr. Sudhir Pai's Session:

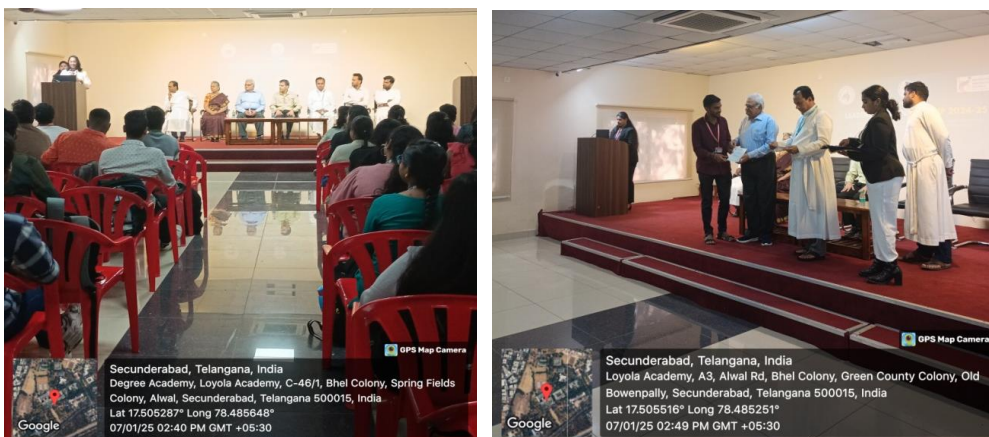

Opening Remarks by Dignitaries

Distinguished dignitaries graced the occasion, including Rev. Fr. Anthony Prabhu and Dr. Shafiq Ahmed, who shared their profound insights on budgeting and governance in national development. Rev. Fr. Anthony Prabhu eloquently articulated the intricate relationship between budgeting and economic management, emphasizing that budget and administration are fundamentally interconnected, with their integration being crucial for economic advancement. Dr. Shafiq Ahmed enriched the discourse by exploring the Politico-Administrative model and governance, drawing upon Thomas Woodrow Wilson's seminal 1887 concept that positions public administration as the systematic application of law and the visible manifestation of governance. He expertly illustrated how policy transformations across central, state, and local levels influence governance frameworks.

Session 1: Guest Lecture Series (10:00 am – 12:15 pm)

First Speaker: Mr. Viswesvar Prel S Pillai (Vishnu Pillai)

The morning session featured Mr. Viswesvar Prel S Pillai, widely known as Vishnu Pillai, a distinguished specialist in technology and governance, who delivered a comprehensive analysis of AI's revolutionary effects on public administration. He addressed several crucial aspects, including AI's impact on employment markets, citing Prime Minister Modi's observations about potential job displacement in mechanical sectors. Mr. Pillai emphasized the fluid nature of technological requirements and the constant need for skill enhancement. He thoroughly examined the Risk-Based Approach of 2006, explaining its significance in AI system

categorization and regulation. His discourse extended to AI's broader implications for administration, climate policies, and governance, particularly focusing on the complexities of black box models and the imperative for explainable AI to maintain public trust. He concluded by exploring the delicate balance between decentralization and recentralization in AI-driven governance structures.

Second Speaker: Prof. Parthasarathi

Prof. Parthasarathi, a renowned authority in economic and administrative policies, examined public administration's evolution in the AI era. He began by invoking Kautilya's Arthashastra, emphasizing the paramount importance of financial management in governance. His presentation weaved together classical wisdom with contemporary challenges, highlighting the need to identify and support vulnerable groups in policymaking.

He analyzed AI's role in transforming governance, weighing its efficiency benefits against privacy, security, and ethics risks. He also stressed the importance of decentralization and civil society participation in governance, underscoring their role in effective administration. Additionally, he examined state administration, focusing on the relationship between the Governor and Chief Minister, with particular emphasis on Articles 200 and 201, which govern the Governor's assent and reconsideration of bills. His discourse extended to globalization challenges, balancing market-driven policies with human rights protection, and China's technological advancement strategy, particularly their focus on reverse engineering and disciplined work ethic.



Interactive Session

The morning session concluded with an engaging question-and-answer period, during which students participated in thought-provoking discussions about AI policies, governance models, and economic growth strategies.

Session 2: Union Budget 2025 Discussion (1:00 pm – 3:00 pm)

The afternoon session featured an in-depth analysis of the Union Budget 2025, with department students presenting their meticulously researched findings on various budgetary aspects. Their presentations encompassed comprehensive analyses of sectoral allocations, fiscal policies driving economic growth, and the budget's implications for employment, infrastructure, and governance. The session observer and judge was senior Dr. N. Maraia Das, Assistant Professor of Economics, School of Agriculture, Loyola Academy, Old Alwal.



It is an extension service provided by the Women Empowerment cell in collaboration with extension cell for two months of period where the contingent staff are full-fledged provided with designing and tailoring of our clothes.

Depth of Knowledge Delivered:

Ms. Sunitha Tiwari, Trainer from the Lions club, taught the contingent staff dresses, blouses, shorts, pants, shirts, kurtas, petticoats, and everything that the human requires. Every day from 5:00 pm to 6:00 pm and sometimes until 7:00 pm the training sessions were conducted except Saturday and Sunday.

Engagement of Participants:

A Q&A session was held and taught multiple times until they understand how to design and stitch.

Learning Outcomes:

- Social Impact: Understanding the importance of learning for themselves.

- Gender Respect: Promoting equality and mutual respect between genders to learn and earn.
- Women Empowerment: Encouraging strength, resilience, and rights awareness
