## MAGIC YOUTH COMMITTEE Annual Report 2025–2026

### **Introduction**

The **MAGIC Youth Committee** (*Men and Women Aiming Greater Initiatives for Change*) of Loyola Academy Degree & PG College actively organized and participated in various student-centered programs during the academic year 2025–2026. The committee focused on promoting leadership, social responsibility, creativity, physical well-being, and collaborative learning among students. This year the committee actively organized various unique and socio-cultural events that displayed various values and qualities that one must imbibe. In the following year we conducted 7 events, the following report presents a summary of the major events conducted by the MAGIC Youth Committee during the academic year 2025–2026.

### **SELECTION PROCESS OF THE COMMITTEE**

The selection procedure was meticulously structured into three distinct stages:

- WRITTEN EXAM
- FIRST ROUND OF INTERVIEW
- FINAL ROUND OF INTERVIEW

#### **1. Written Exam:**

The written exam was conducted on 20<sup>th</sup> June, 2025 after the class hours (i.e. 3:15 PM to 4:15 PM) in various classrooms of Inigo block. The duration of the exam was one hour. The test was designed to assess the applicants' knowledge of committee roles and responsibilities, Awareness of the past and present Ex Core Committee members, Understanding of general college affairs and current events and Personal interests and leadership aptitude. Based on the performance, 85 students were selected for the next round of the selection process.

## 2. First Round of Interview:

The first round of interview was conducted over a course of 8 days [28<sup>th</sup>, 29<sup>th</sup>, 30<sup>th</sup> of June, 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> of July] at IG 302. The interviews were conducted by the Staff In-charge of MAGIC Youth (i.e. Mr. Sujeeth Sujay Kumar), Ex-core committee and Ex-student council members. Out of the top 85 students, 15 students were selected for the next round of the selection process.

## 3. Final Round of Interview:

The second and final round of interview was conducted on 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> of July at 4:30 pm at the Office of the Vice Principal of School of Arts, Humanities and Sciences (i.e. Inigo Block). The interview was conducted for the selected top 15 students for the portfolio of the First leads and Second leads. It was conducted by the Vice Principal of School of Arts, Humanities and Sciences (i.e. Rev. Fr. B. Peter SJ) and staff In-charge of MAGIC Youth (i.e. Mr. Sujeeth Sujay Kumar). Out of the top 15 students, 2 were assigned as the First Leads and 4 as Second Leads.

The Results of the Final round of interview and the newly assigned MAGIC Youth Core Committee was revealed and officially confirmed on 16<sup>th</sup> July.

On the first day, the UNHRC Committee focused on the challenges faced by migrants and refugees. Delegates discussed how social media can fuel racial hatred and xenophobia, instances of racial profiling and unequal asylum processing for migrants from different regions, and discriminatory conditions in detention centres, including poor living standards and lack of proper care. The committee highlighted the need for awareness and reforms to protect migrants' rights.

Delegates proposed stricter monitoring of social media to prevent hate speech, fair and standardized asylum procedures to reduce bias, and better oversight of detention centres to ensure humane treatment. The committee agreed on the importance of protecting human rights and promoting equality for all migrants and refugees.

warfare, emphasizing its destabilizing effects on international peace and strategic stability. Concerns were raised regarding state accountability, lack of global regulation, and the risks of cyber espionage. Various perspectives emerged, with some nations advocating strict international monitoring, while others stressed the need for national security sovereignty. The session concluded with a consensus on the urgency of formulating binding frameworks.

## ➤ Day 2:

On the second day, delegates proposed practical solutions to regulate cyber weapons. Key measures included drafting international treaties for cyber arms control, establishing verification and reporting mechanisms, promoting transparency among nations, and creating a UN-backed monitoring body for cyber threats. Emphasis was placed on collaborative cybersecurity capacity building and sanctions for non-compliance. The committee agreed to consolidate these recommendations into a draft resolution for final adoption, reflecting a collective commitment to maintain international peace and strategic stability in cyberspace.

### ➤ **Day 1:**

The AIPPM committee convened to deliberate on regulating social media platforms in India, focusing on intermediary liability, misinformation, and free speech protections. Delegates debated the balance between preventing harmful content and safeguarding freedom of expression. Concerns were raised about the role of platforms in curbing fake news, user privacy, and the potential misuse of regulations. Varied viewpoints emerged, with some advocating stricter accountability for platforms, while others emphasized protecting democratic rights online.

### ➤ **Day 2:**

On the second day, delegates proposed actionable solutions including clearer legal frameworks for intermediary liability, fact-checking mechanisms to combat misinformation, user awareness campaigns, and safeguards to protect free speech. Recommendations also included periodic audits of platform compliance and a government–platform collaborative monitoring system. The committee agreed to consolidate these proposals into a draft resolution aimed at fostering responsible social media use while protecting fundamental rights.

### ➤ Day 1:

The MoD Caucus convened to discuss monitoring and accountability mechanisms in ongoing conflicts under the UNSC and the role of non-state actors (NSAs) and state-backed terrorism. Delegates debated the misuse of veto power, emphasizing how it delays conflict resolution and hampers humanitarian aid. The impact of NSAs and state-backed terrorism on destabilizing conflict zones and threatening civilians was highlighted. Various nations shared perspectives on strengthening international oversight, cooperation, and preventive measures. The session concluded with consensus on the importance of preparing evidence-based speeches for formal debates.

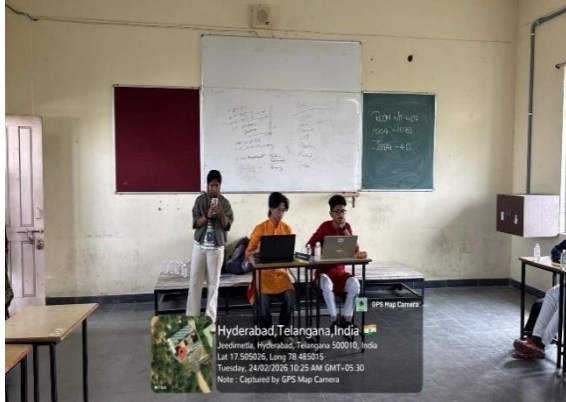
### ➤ Day 2:

On the second day, delegates proposed actionable measures to address accountability and security challenges. Key solutions included revising UNSC procedures to limit veto misuse in humanitarian crises, establishing stricter monitoring of NSAs, sanctioning states supporting terrorism, and enhancing UN peacekeeping mandates. Emphasis was placed on collaboration between member states, intelligence sharing, and diplomatic strategies to reduce conflict escalation. The committee agreed to draft a resolution consolidating these measures to improve accountability and peacekeeping effectiveness in conflict zones.
